1. CREATION: A WORLD OF BEAUTY

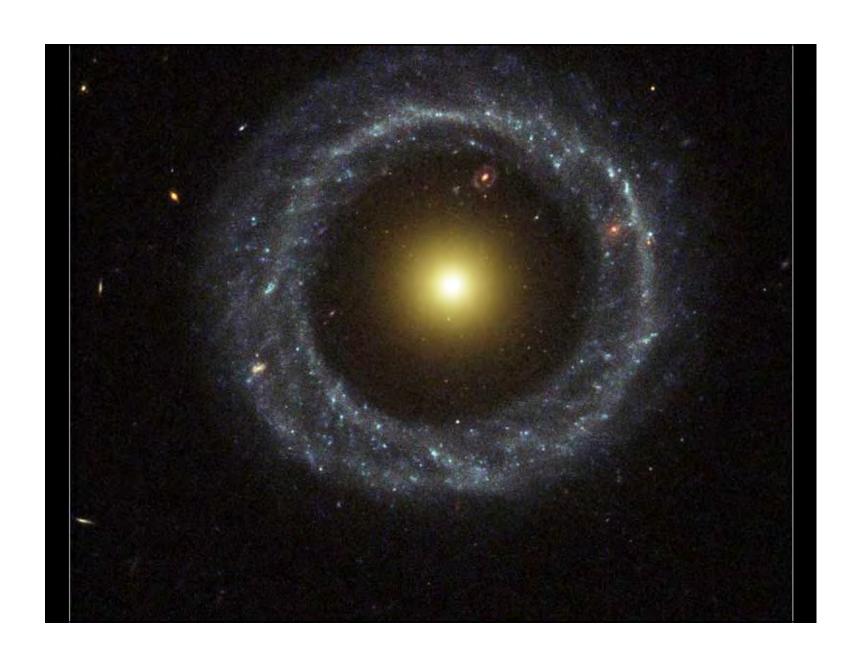
Not a place in need of 'fixing'

THE HUMAN HEART

A deep yearning, inclination for happiness, for wholeness, for perfection, the SELF (MY GOOD)

A deep yearning, inclination for VALUE, for things of intrinsic worth independent of the self, for OTHERS, for loving rightly (COMMON GOOD)

THE AFFECTION FOR SELF/HAPPINESS IS OUR NATURAL DISPOSITION

THE AFFECTION FOR OTHERS/JUSTICE IS OUR *FREE* DISPOSITION

TOGETHER, THEY ARE THE KEY TO RATIONAL FREEDOM

- When we choose in light of God's generous love and
- When the two affections are in appropriate harmonic balance, *then*
- Our act reveals the perfection of rationality that is freedom

THE RESULT: ARTISTIC PRESENCE/POISE

- Balance of presence to self and others
- The athlete, dancer, musician
- Artist
- The inner "stillpoint" of readiness

THE PRESENT MOMENT AS GIFT FOR COMMUNION

- The Spirit's "now" (the audible...)
- When genuine self pours out in gracious, creative liberality

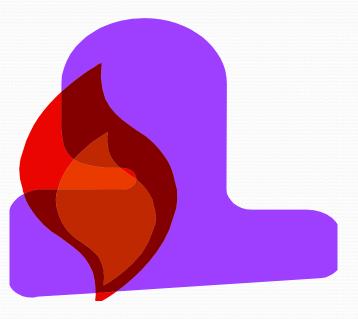
Responding to divine love

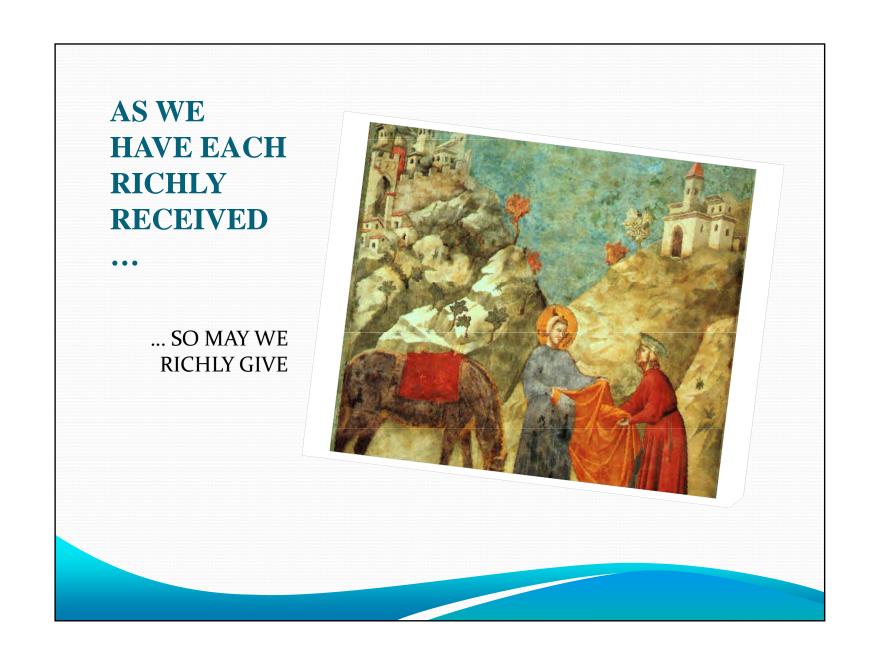

The beauty of things, too, if we but consider the diversity of lights, forms and colors in elementary, inorganic, and organic bodies, as in heavenly bodies and in minerals, in stones and metals, and in plants and animals, clearly proclaims these three attributes of God.... Therefore, whoever is not enlightened by such great splendor in created things is blind; whoever remains unheedful of such great outcries is deaf; whoever does not praise God in all these effects is dumb; whoever does not turn to the First Principle after so many signs is a fool.

Bonaventure, Mind's Journey into God I, 14-15

Proclaiming the joy of the Gospel through beauty:

Every form of catechesis would do well to attend to the "way of beauty" (via pulchritudinis). Proclaiming Christ means showing that to believe in and to follow him is not only something right and true, but also something beautiful, capable of filling life with new splendour and profound joy, even in the midst of difficulties. Every expression of true beauty can thus be acknowledged as a path leading to an encounter with the Lord Jesus. This has nothing to do with fostering an aesthetic relativism which would downplay the inseparable bond between truth, goodness and beauty, but rather a renewed esteem for beauty as a means of touching the human heart and enabling the truth and goodness of the Risen Christ to radiate within it. If, as Saint Augustine says, we love only that which is beautiful, the incarnate Son, as the revelation of infinite beauty, is supremely lovable and draws us to himself with bonds of love. So a formation in the via pulchritudinis ought to be part of our effort to pass on the faith. ... We must be bold enough to discover new signs and new symbols, new flesh to embody and communicate the word, and different forms of beauty which are valued in different cultural settings, including those unconventional modes of beauty which may mean little to the evangelizers, yet prove particularly attractive for others.

"Beauty does not stand alone in the universe, isolated and remote, under glass and precious for its rarity. Beauty is the bridge to justice. It's the lost beauty of nature that warns us against pollution. It's the beauty of a child's face that brings us to see the ugliness of racism. It's the beauty of life that brings us to rage against the injustice that obstructs it for anyone. Beauty is the glue that holds the world together. To bring peace, to nurture hope, to wage justice, then, it

is necessary to teach beauty or nothing is too valuable to be destroyed. We may well be spending far too much time teaching skills and productivity and efficiency and far too little time on music and art and poetry and flowers and literary appreciation. To raise a child well, we must seed a place in their souls for beauty. To live life fully, we must learn to take time out for beauty. To build buildings that do not become ghettos, we must be willing to spend as much time on their beauty as we do on their function. Unless we make beauty the centerpiece of our lives, we are not really living, we are only breathing. If in this millennium we really want justice, we must learn to cultivate beauty." -- Joan D.
